"Embracing Our Neighbors," the theme for the June 2019 convention of the South Dakota Women of the ELCA, calls us to look around us, actually "see" our neighbors, and to speak out when their rights are not being protected, their needs not being met, and to embrace them as our neighbors and sisters. This is a big order, a strong calling, and a way of living that will strengthen our resolve to "promote healing and wholeness in the church, the society, and the world." Plan to attend the convention to learn, grow, and participate in fellowship that will expand the "neighborhood" in which we see ourselves and energize us to do the work we are called to do.

This issue of our synodical newsletter includes the registration form for the June 21 & 22 convention. (And don't forget to plan to attend the pre-convention events on June 20 as well!) Please submit these EARLY. There will be deadlines for voting members to the South Dakota Synod Convention and nominees to be voting members to the 2020 Triennial Convention in Phoenix. These deadlines are ones to which we must adhere so pre-convention materials can be sent to voting members and nominees for the Triennial can be vetted by the nominating committee.

We cannot accept nominees for the Triennial from the floor at the synodical convention, so be sure to submit them before the deadline. I can't state often enough how important it is that each unit submit a name as nominee to attend this convention. We need to fill all the positions and have an alternate for each person who is elected. One voting member from our delegation must be a "woman of color or a woman for whom English is not a first language" and one must be a "woman for whom this is the first Triennial Convention attended as a voting member." Your new president or her representative will also attend as leader of the South Dakota Synod's delegation. Of course, if your new president is a woman of color or first-time attendee, she can complete that requirement for our delegation.

All expenses for the convention are paid for voting members. There are "Early Bird" rates in effect now so I'd encourage registration during 2019. Can you or your unit or conference provide funds for attendee scholarship assistance? We hope the Synodical Women will be able to provide some assistance for all who attend. We don't want cost to be the deciding factor for anyone who would like to attend. If you have questions, please contact me or Hannah Fleming (contact info on page 11).

I hope you are all looking forward to conference Spring Gatherings soon. This winter has made me reclusive, I fear, but the promise of attending anything with the word "SPRING" in its title is keeping me going.

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. - Luke 4:1-13

We are in the midst of the 40 days of Lent. This is a time for us to meditate, to contemplate our mortality, our sins, our pride, our failings, all that led to Jesus being crucified on Good Friday.

In the Gospel above, Jesus is led into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. For 40 days he has nothing to eat. The devil tempts a hungry Jesus, saying "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus resists.

On the surface, turning a stone into bread

doesn't seem like that big of a deal. Jesus is hungry; it's not hurting anyone, so why not? This is the insidious nature of temptation. Temptations, by definition, are hard to ignore or resist. They may even seem logical and harmless like turning a stone into bread when you haven't eaten for a month. But Jesus saw straight to the heart of the issue. The devil was not concerned that Jesus had enough to eat. The devil was trying to get Jesus to perform a miracle the way the devil wanted it performed, rather than performing a miracle as God wishes. The devil was trying to define who Jesus is under the devil's own terms.

Just as the devil continued to tempt Jesus, so too are we tempted on a regular basis. Our temptations may not be as large as this. Our temptations are more basic to our every day lives. We are tempted to act in certain ways to gain acceptance, even when those ways are harmful to others or ourselves. We let others tell us how to behave, what to do, who to spend time with, or who to avoid. We let others define our own worth in our jobs, in our families, even in our own

"Visibility is the key to getting new women."

New entry points into Women of the ELCA are necessary to build the organization, the director of intergenerational programs told leaders in Chicago, Feb. 22-24. "How many of you say, 'How do we get more young women involved?" Elizabeth McBride asked at the Women of the ELCA's annual Conference of Presidents (COP). That's not the question you should be asking, said McBride, who is also editor of the online magazine for young adult women, Café. "You should be asking, 'How do we get more new women involved?' We don't have an age issue; we have an access-to-entry issue," McBride said. She suggested moving ministries like quilting, book clubs and service events outside the church. "Move your event for human trafficking to include your local youth group or a campus ministry near you if you have one," she suggested. "Visibility is access." WELCA Blog 2/27/2019

bodies. It can be all too easy to be tempted to believe we are worth less than others. That we are not talented enough, rich enough, smart enough, that our bodies are not the right shape or size, or too plain or not pretty enough. We let others tell us who we should be and what is the "right" or "wrong" way to live. We let the world define our identities, which is an insidious temptation because it can be so hard to realize when we do it.

Letting others define who you are distracts you from who you really are: a child of God. Through our baptisms we were called by name: "You, child of God, you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever." This was

said over you during your baptism. Your identity is not in this world but in God. You are a child of God.

Jesus did not fall for the temptation to let the devil define him. During his 40 days he was tempted, but held firm to his identity in God. During these 40 days of Lent I challenge you, in the face of every temptation telling you who you are or should be, to remind yourself that you are a child of God. Your worth is defined by God who came down in the form of Jesus to live, teach, heal, love, and die on the cross for us. Then on Easter morning, celebrate anew your identity as a child of God, marked with the cross of Christ in your baptism, and given the promise of eternal life with God through the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Transition

Isaiah Chapter 43 is a container for the power of God's passion for Israel and offers words of comfort for us all as we read about the Almighty's protection over us and His immeasurable love for us. Those, He says, who are precious in His sight. Of course, the promise in verse two carries us through the most difficult times:

"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you, and through the rivers, they will not overwhelm you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned or scorched, nor will the flame kindle upon you."

Hallelujah! Thanks be to God!

Then we get to the middle of that same chapter. God moves from coddling us to calling us forth to transform our believing into boldness, to transfigure words of comfort into acts of confidence, and to transition from the predictability of the familiar to absolute faith in the utter unknown. God said, in verses 18 and 19, "Do not earnestly remember the former things; neither consider the things of old. Behold, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs forth; do you not perceive and know it and will you not give heed to it? I will even make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

It's no secret that human beings resist change. Even positive change is challenging. Yet in these passages God is grabbing us by the shoulders and saying, "Listen! The life I have given you is not stagnant! All that I created is in a constant state of change! Can't you see that! Why are you worried? I AM is with you! It is in me that you live and MOVE and have your being! I have promised you that the rivers I bring to the desert will not overwhelm

you. Let go of the former things and let me take you into the new."

As our hearts and minds contemplate the wilderness journey of Lent, the days preceding the earth-shattering, destiny-changing, veil-splitting death-unto-life transition of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, I'm reminded that God's urgent beckoning in Isaiah is echoed from the mouth of Jesus to the disciples who are pushing back on the imminent change He is joyfully sharing with them. He tells them that as He dies in the flesh He will live again transformed, returning to the Father so that anything they ask in His name, believing, He will grant them.

Woo Hoo!

Not so much. The disciples don't want their lives with Jesus to be interrupted, even though Jesus explains that the Holy Spirit will come in His stead enabling those who believe to do what He has done, and even greater things! Jesus goes to great lengths to lay out for the disciples the magnitude of what is about to take place and the glory that will come from it, and yet...the disciples are stuck in what their lives with Jesus have been like to that point, unable to let go of what they have known to venture into the unknown, in faith, believing what Jesus said - that it will be even better.

The truth is no one is eager to experience pain. And when we focus on the loss that often comes with change, it is excruciatingly painful. The disciples, even in their lack of understanding, could sense this journey into the new jack swing was going to hurt. And hurt a lot. Perhaps they believed, beyond their ability to bear it. So blinded by their backward glances, and paralyzed by the fear of their perceived limitations, they tried to desperately cling to the familiar – even to the point of trying to talk Jesus out of His destiny on behalf of the world. Imagine if they had been successful.

Finally, Jesus tells them, "I give you my peace. Not as the world gives you. Do not let your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid. You heard me tell you I am going away and I am

coming back to you. If you really loved Me, you would have been glad, because I am going to the Father; for the Father is greater and mightier than I am." (John 14:27 amp)

Contrast that exchange with the gospel account of Mary's "alabaster flask of very precious perfume" that she poured over Jesus at the protest of the men in the room who were enraged by the wasteful use of what could have been sold at a high price to benefit the poor.

Yet Jesus praises her. Why? Because she saw the bigger picture and was all in. I'm sure Mary was equally upset at the thought of Jesus suffering and dying, but she seemed to understand that the "why" behind the "what" was of paramount importance. So much so that not only had she come to accept what needed to happen, but she committed herself to honoring it.

Jesus said of her in Matthew's telling that her deed was noble, and that she had done so to prepare Him for His burial. He added in 26:13 that "...wherever this good news is preached in the whole world, what this woman has done will be told also, in memory of her."

Yes, indeed, the transition from death unto life can be a blistering one. But in so many ways God has expressed the necessity of change. Not the least of which is how the winter season in its absence of color and seemingly relentless, life ravaging subzero temperatures gives way to the explosion of vibrant hues, new growth, and flowering blossoms of splendor. So how do we faithfully leave the past behind and walk boldly into the uncertain greater thing God is calling us to?

We can certainly follow Mary's lead and look beyond ourselves to the greater good, accepting that life means change whether we like it or not. We can see in what Mary did that when we have a heart after God our primary desire becomes to honor the path He is leading us into, refusing to cower in fear or lament what might have been. And we can remind ourselves of the galvanizing perspective laid out in Hebrews chapters 11 and 12. Chapter 11, of course, being the honor roll of the heroes and heroines of faith. Following that impressive roster,

chapter 12 reveals the pages in the playbook that will enable us to move through transitions, even the most difficult ones, without becoming weary or faint hearted.

Doing a New Thing

As the new Executive Director of Prison Congregations of America (PCA), it would be much easier for me to simply carry on with the familiar. But if so, I would have to turn a deaf ear to God's voice that is beckoning, "Behold! I am doing a new thing!" Nutrition programs for pregnant women and young children are highly cost effective. Congress should boost funding for programs proven effective in reducing hunger long-term.

Is this sort of advocacy appropriate in churches? You bet. This is not about a candidate or party. It's about a moral (and practical) issue.
