Every Baptized Person Is A Minister

Dear People of God,

In the July synod newsletter, I wrote about a discernment resource titled, "Called to Lead." Since writing, the entire resource is available in the Pasque Learning Community as a discernment course (<u>www.sdsynodlearns.org</u>). Over the course of the next several synod newsletters, I will include language and questions from the document in order that we can be in self-contemplation, as well as conversations of faith with others synod-wide. Invite someone to coffee and put these questions in front of you. Christ promises to be present: For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them (Matt. 18.20)."

On page 7, the document focuses on every baptized person as a minister:

One of the images used in the New Testament to describe the church is the "body of Christ." In his first letter to the Christian congregation in the city of Corinth, Paul reminds the people, "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it" (1 Corinthians 12:27). The crucified, risen and ascended Christ continues to carry out his ministry in the world through the church as his body. Just as the Holy Spirit descended upon the body of Jesus as he rose from the water of his own baptism, so the Holy Spirit also descended upon the extended body of Jesus – the church – at Pentecost. The entire church, including each of its members, shares the same vocation of ministry that was bestowed upon Jesus. To be a Christian, therefore, a follower of Christ, means also to be a minister of his good news in word and deed.

Celebrating What God Is Doing

Before too long, the calendar will change over to another year, which means that for many of the congregations in South Dakota, the countdown to the Annual Meeting begins. Those who know me, know of my love of Robert's Rules of Order and parliamentary procedure. Some might think this time of year is exciting for me, and it is. But, maybe not for the reasons we think. The Annual Meeting, at its best, isn't just a list of reports, a few elections, and approving a budget. Those are often the necessary items to include on the agenda. The Annual Meeting is at its best when all of those things are a part of celebrating what God has done and is doing through your community. Sharing the story of how the Good News of Jesus is making a difference in the world today.

This doesn't happen all by itself; it takes a little work to reimagine the mundane work of the church to be a celebration. So, I wanted to time this encouragement far enough beforehand that seeds might be planted for how you will share what God is doing. A few considerations:

- Narrative Budget: In addition to a line-item budget, a Narrative Budget helps to tell the story of your congregation through stories and pictures. They take a little time to create, especially the first time, but there is help. Check out the new course in Pasque on Developing a Narrative Budget to break up the steps in the process.
- Temple Talks: Recruit a few members to share a story of how God has been at work in their lives in the last year.
- Share a story of what God is doing in the world because we do it together. Check out Stories of Faith in Action to learn more about how your Mission Support is impacting lives across the globe.
- ELCA World Hunger celebrates 50 Years in 2025, and if you're looking for an excuse to have cake at your meeting, here's your excuse.

I give thanks for what God is doing around and through us as the congregations of the South Dakota Synod. And I give thanks for the ministries we share for the proclamation of the Gospel.
